Message from the Executive Director and Chair of the Board of Directors:

This past year saw a record-breaking increase in the need for support, where approximately one in every eight residents of our community relied on Project SHARE's emergency services. Through incredible community work between our donors, volunteers, partners, funders and staff we were able to meet this increased need and ensure none of our neighbours went hungry.

We were able to safely resume our pre-pandemic shopping model, re-opening our food room following public health guidelines to provide more choice and dignity for families. We secured funding to improve our building accessibility this year through a Capital grant and ordered a larger, refrigerated van with funding from a Resilient Communities fund grant, both through the Ontario Trillium Foundation. These projects will increase our capacity and ability to deliver client-centred services. We expanded our homelessness prevention services following best practices identified by a consultation with Org Code, delivering services through a consortium with Community Care St. Catharines & Thorold, The Hope Centre and Community Care West Niagara. This strengthens our services to the community and works toward a no wrong door approach to homelessness prevention.

Our collaboration extended into the newly formed Feed Niagara partnership of the ten Feed Ontario member food banks serving the Niagara region. Through this collaboration we secured additional funding for bulk food purchasing, collectively stretching our impact to meet the increased need throughout the region. The need in our community is alarming, and we engaged in many advocacy opportunities this year including co-hosting the Feed Ontario Hunger Report Roadshow, attending the Feed Ontario MPP breakfast, the Ministry of Red Tape Reduction roundtable discussion, and communicating regularly with our local elected officials to work towards our vision of an end to the struggle against poverty and empowered people in need in Niagara Falls.

We are continually grateful for the incredible generosity we receive from our community partners, donors and volunteers, and the dedication of our staff and board of directors. Our community truly is at work to keep our neighbours fed, housed and healthy.


Emergency Support Services statistics in 2022-2023:

Our Impact on the Community:

"I don't know how I would get through the month. ODSP (Ontario Disability Support Program) does not give enough money to buy healthy food."

"In the past two years, my family has struggled financially. Without the help of Project SHARE, we would be worse off than we are and without healthy food on our table."

Strengthening our Impact - Feed Niagara:



Project SHARE continued to collaborate with fellow Feed Ontario member food banks as Feed Niagara. This included bulk food purchasing together with grant funding and designated community donations.

In 2022-2023, the Emergency Food Program:

• Distributed 1,005,811 pounds of food to people in need.

• Was accessed 44,803 times by individuals. Our Community Garden hosted 145 plots, and produced 2,159 pounds of fresh produce for our Emergency Food Program.





- Our Emergency prescription funding program is a partnership with a local pharmacy to assist clients with emergency prescription expenses once per year (pain-killers and narcotic products are excluded).
- Our Eye glass support program is a partnership that assists clients who are in need of eyeglasses without any other assistance available.
- Dental Program: The Brushed Aside program helped 16 clients in need of dentures or extractions with an interest free loan of up to \$1,000. The Dental Cleaning program provided adults with a preventative dental cleaning. These programs were funded in part by the Niagara Region through the Niagara Prosperity Initiative.



Back to School Program:

800 children received support from our Back to School Program during the summer of 2022. Children between the ages of 4-17 received new sneakers, backpacks, school supplies, and healthy snacks to get their school year off on a positive start. Parents often tell us that Back to School can be just as stressful as Christmas financially. Thanks to the support of many individual donors along with our corporate partners Canadian Tire Bank and PenFinancial Credit Union.

Christmas Program:

5,220 individuals within 2,351 families received grocery store gift cards and gifts for children 17 and under to help provide some Christmas magic during the holiday season in 2022. 13,982 pounds of toys and gifts and over \$130,500 in grocery gift cards were distributed. The Christmas program was generously supported by many individuals, businesses, churches, and community groups.





Housing

Help

In 2022-2023, our Housing Help Program assisted:

- 707 families in their search for housing.
- 211 families through the Low-income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP)
- 129 families through the Niagara Emergency Energy Fund (NEEF)
- 224 families through the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP)
- Provided 1,153 families with bus tickets for transportation

During the last fiscal year, we expanded our housing services by creating a team of two housing focused staff members within our client services team. Clients work continuously with the same staff member to build a relationship of trust and receive individualized, ongoing case management to reduce barriers to finding and sustaining housing. During the last year:

707 families received housing support

- Niagara Regional Housing application assistance, letters of support & advocacy
- Resources & referrals to essential community supports including legal assistance
- Eviction prevention
- Re-housing
- Money management support





Volunteer Support:

Volunteers are an integral part of our organization, performing many essential tasks to help deliver our mission. Our core group of volunteers give their time daily to distribute emergency food. These volunteers provide a friendly welcome and help to make families feel comfortable when visiting Project SHARE. Warehouse volunteers provide muscle power and are detailed when sorting through donations of both perishable and nonperishable foods to follow Food Banks Canada's safe food handling guidelines.

Additional volunteer opportunities include helping at events such as our annual food drives, Coldest Night of the Year walk and an assortment of other community events. After business hours and weekend opportunities are available occasionally throughout the year.



Volunteer Support:



10,706 hours of volunteer service were contributed to Project SHARE in 2022-2023, which is the equivalent value of 5.5 fulltime staff persons! Project SHARE relies on the generous support of donors, volunteers, third party event organizers and program funders. We are so grateful for the community support received throughout the year. This support helps us realize our vision to end the struggle against poverty and empower those in need.
